John, C, Sibball Major 2<sup>nd</sup> Artillery commanding Military post of Sitka, Alaska, and stationed there.

Answer to interrogatory Second

I know Lieutenant W. R. French 2<sup>d</sup> artillery I have known him since December 1865; I first became acquainted with him at the Presidio of San Francisco where we were stationed together until about April 1867. He did not belong to my battery, and my associations with him were chiefly of a social nature — we messed together, and my opportunities of means of knowing of his general character and conduct as an officer and gentleman were those usually afforded by such intercourse. I have met him casually several times since.

Answer to interrogatory Third

I deemed Lieutenant French a very peculiar character. He was very gentlemanly in his deportment, and I thought him one possessing of the strictest regard for truth and honor. He was also very steady in his habits, and in no way

forming an opinion as to his present fitness  
for remaining as an officer in the Army.

Answer to interrogatory Sixth

My means of forming an opinion as to Lieut.  
of our "general capacity and qualifications as  
an officer" are those stated in the foregoing  
answers; and my opinion was that, in these  
matters, his grade was below the medium of young  
officers, just commencing military life; and  
that his future fitness for service would depend  
entirely upon his first few years of training,  
which to make him fitted, would necessarily

then I have not known him sufficiently to

I did not think him at that time possessed

receipt-roll properly witnessed, as required by Regulation, for his vouchers for expenditures, Lt. Goucks made a practice of giving them due-bills without taking receipts; and these due-bills were bought up by the post trader. When presented by the post trader Lt. Goucks gave one check for the whole amount of them. As the result of such improper practice he had paid out in June 1842, \$1521<sup>83</sup> to  
for which he had no voucher other than his own memorandum due-bills. The Indians paid had been discharged and had left the post, as Lt. Goucks informed me.

In the Subsistence Department, an examination of funds and accounts showed a deficit of \$302<sup>42</sup>. The only explanation offered by Lt. Goucks, was that the officers at the post owed him that amount for subsistence stores sold them. As the paymaster had visited the post in June, & could see no excuse for his not having collected such indebtedness prior to inspection — especially when he was certifying that the funds were in his possession.






